

## BOARD OF TRUSTEES MEETING

UHSAA Office

November 15, 2018

9:00 a.m.

**1. Welcome and Chair Business:** Chair Whitlock welcomed members and visitors to the meeting. Mr. Brotherson was excused.

A. Reverence/Thought: Ms. Shill offered a prayer.

B. Pledge of Allegiance/Patriotic Thought: Mr. Durst said it is a difficult time in America with all the political tension, but with the recent Veteran's Day celebration and the death of Major Taylor it brought it back around for him that he is proud to be an American. He led the members in the pledge of allegiance.

C. Approval of Minutes – August 23, 2018 (summary on UHSAA website):

**MOTION:** Mr. Jarman motioned to approve the minutes of August 23, 2018. Ms. Richards seconded the motion. Motion carried.

D. Approval of Board Agenda for November 15, 2018:

**MOTION:** Mr. Grunig motioned to approve the Board Agenda. Mr. Sherwood seconded the motion. Motion carried.

**2. Realignment:** Mr. Cuff reminded members that the make up of the board has changed since the last realignment and there are now 15 board members as compared to 28 previously. He feels the representation has not changed. There will be at least two more meetings and a public hearing to finish the realignment process. He encouraged meeting guests to reach out to their Board representative. He said there were two objectives for this meeting: (1) Set the calendar for the remaining meetings and (2) Place schools into classifications as a first consideration and determine the original bubble schools. There will be secondary bubble schools created with regards to free and reduced lunch percentages before the next meeting. The Board will deal with primary bubble schools prior to the secondary bubble schools. Bubble Schools are considered tied in enrollment and the enrollment numbers no longer are considered.

A. Timetable (p. 44): After today's meeting (November 15) and classifications are determined, bubble schools will be able to apply to go up or down a classification and free and reduced applications will be considered. Mr. Cuff discussed the proposed meeting dates.

Second Meeting: Wednesday, November 28 at 11:00 am. The original schools will declare classification preference, second consideration of classification and first consideration of member schools' placement into regions.

Public Hearing: Wednesday, December 5 at 6:30 pm at Jordan High School.

Third Meeting: Thursday, December 6 at 9:00 am for finalization of alignment.

**MOTION:** Mr. McKee motioned to accept the proposed meeting schedule, November 28 at 11:00 am at the UHSAA Office, December 5 at 6:30 at Jordan High School and December 6 at 9 am at the UHSAA Office. Ms. Shill seconded the motion. Motion carried.

B. Format and procedures (pp. 45-46): The BOT is able to make determinations based on best interest of the Association.

C: Placement of Schools into Classifications: Mr. Cuff said there are 156 member schools including the three new public member schools (Alpine, Jordan and Washington School Districts). There are seven member schools (Salt Lake Performing Arts, Tuachan, AISU, Venture, Liahona, Paradigm and Lava Heights) that do not participate in athletics and will not be part of today's discussion. Their placement will take place at another time. Mr. Cuff asked members to consider how many schools should be in 6A Classification. Everything is considered from top classification down except in football in which the 1A classification is determined and works up. Classifications 6A, 5A, 4A enrollment numbers are for juniors and seniors. These numbers were used to help address demographics and drop out rate from sophomore to senior class. Classifications 3A, 2A and 1A use enrollment numbers of 10-12 grades. Mr. Cuff reminded members that more bubble schools is often helpful and they need to make sure 1A classification is viable. The staff's starting point proposal was shown to members without revealed names of member schools. Members looked at different scenarios/proposals with numbers of schools in classifications. Ratios were also discussed.

**MOTION:** Mr. Jarman motioned to show the school names on chart. Ms. Shill seconded the motion. Mr. McKee asked why names are needed. Mr. Jarman felt new schools will be moving and not showing as bubble schools. Motion carried.

Discussion on new schools and projected numbers. More discussion on lower classifications.

**MOTION:** Mr. Jarman motioned to approve the first consideration of number of schools in each classification (6A-31, 5A-22, 4A-27, 3A-22, 2A-23, 1A-24). List of schools and classifications will follow minutes. Ms. Richards seconded the motion. Motion carried, but not unanimously. Mr. Anderson voted no.

Football Alignment: Mr. Cuff said there are 107 football member schools. This does not include Wayne and Monument Valley. The staff proposes that 6A, 5A and 4A schools remain unchanged in football. The staff proposal is for 3A-11 schools, 2A-8 schools and 1A-8 schools. The staff's second proposal would be to eliminate 1A football with 3A-14 schools and 2A-13 schools. Discussion continued regarding number of schools in the lower classifications.

**MOTION:** Mr. Jarman motioned to approve the first consideration of number of schools in each classification (6A-31, 5A-22, 4A-27, 3A-11, 2A-8, 1A-8) for football. List of schools and classifications will follow the minutes. Mr. McKee seconded the motion. Motion carried.

Mr. Cuff said the information will be posted on the website later this afternoon. Media and member schools will be notified.

Mr. Schena introduced Adam Britt who will be replacing him in January. Mr. Britt has been a coach of basketball and golf. He is currently the Millard School Board president. Mr. Britt said

the realignment is tough job. He thinks everyone should attend a realignment meeting just to realize all the factors that need to be considered. He is looking forward to service on the UHSAA BOT.

**3. Legal Report:** Mr. Van Wagoner reported on the developments in the girls' football suit. The plaintiff asked the court to certify a class and a sub class. The defendants opposed. The court issued an opinion denying the motion for classification for all girls interested in sports so numerosity failed. The judge did permit class certification for all girls interested in football in the three named districts. Nothing has happened since the opinion was issued except for some discussion on a potential settlement. Depositions will be taken of class representatives.

Mr. Van Wagoner also reported on a joint meeting that was held with representatives of the AG Office, schools involved in litigation, superintendents, school districts, State Office of Education and Risk Management. The meeting's purpose was to try to make sense of how to structure and make a clear delineation of ways in which sports for girls could become championship sports. It was a long discussion. It was felt that the UHSAA should lead out with ideas how to make those determinations. Some of the ideas could be drawn from NCAA with regards to women's sports in college. Implementing these will probably take additional staff. Mr. Holmes said they discussed "low-hanging fruit." What can be done immediately? Sanctioning competitive cheerleading was a consideration. Mr. Sherwood thinks sanctioning competitive cheerleading is important to allow catastrophic insurance coverage when they are at competitions. He feels sanctioning will reduce costs for participants. They are using schools' busses and wearing uniforms representing the schools. It would be much cleaner to bring competitive cheerleading on as a sanctioned activity. Mr. Van Wagoner reminded members the court, in years past, ruled cheerleading did not constitute a sport with regards to Title IX. It would be good for participation numbers of female students, but not qualify for Title IX. Mr. Sherwood said it would show good faith in expanding girls' sports. Mr. McKee said the fees are outrageous for cheerleading because of the competition. Mr. Durst asked if it would be coed? It was felt it would remain the same. Ms. Richards said her school board was in favor of adding competitive cheerleading. Mr. Holmes asked about drill team extending into two seasons. He thinks the participation in drill team should be counted twice. Discussion of the possibility because they are putting in the time. Mr. Van Wagoner said there would need to be two competitions.

Mr. Cuff said there is discussion of girls' wrestling. Ms. Whittaker said it is being reported there are over 200 girl wrestlers in the state. E Sports is also in discussion. Mr. Sherwood said there is a place for E Sports in schools. NFHS now has an official partner. It is video gaming and currently has more spectators than hockey internationally and is no different than sitting in front of the TV watching football. Some people don't want to call E Sports a sport because they are not active. Mr. Sherwood thinks it could be sanctioned as an activity so schools interested could begin competing. The official NFHS partner already manages the program, competition and behavior. There is a demographic of students that are isolated in their homes playing games by themselves and E Sports could help them begin to play as a team. It will teach cooperation, unity and develop skills participating with others. Mr. Cuff said it is just a matter of time because five states joined this year. The UHSAA is waiting to see how it goes for them and then we can move forward. Mr. Jarman said then we need to consider the Mountain Biking group. Mr. Cuff said there is bass fishing, rowing, canoeing water polo, rugby...the sky is the limit. Ms. Whittaker said the Committee is working on seeing how other states determine qualifying factors to add additional sports and activities. Ms. Belnap brought up the fee issue being discussed by the USBE. Mr. Schena said the schools have limited resources. If the fees become waiver eligible, there will need to be cuts. Mr. Whitlock said in his district choir is the most expensive

program even more than football or cheerleaders. Fee waivers in choir are double other activities. Mr. Cuff said fees are high, but the alternative is club and those fees are much higher.

#### 4. **New Schools Member Applications for 2019-2020:**

A. Cedar Valley High School – Eagle Mountain (pp. 59-60): Sharon Mardesich, AD; Courtney Johnson, Principal; and Scott Mansfield, Assistant Principal were in attendance. Students are in process of declaration of attendance at the new school. They have concerns for the socio-economics at the school and would appreciate help with travel.

B. Crimson Cliffs High School – Washington (pp. 61-61): Mr. Cuff said Crimson Cliffs is in Washington City. The school is located between Pine View and Desert Hills.

C. Jordan District High School – Herriman (pp. 63-64): Mr. Kochevar, principal, said the boundaries have been approved and a survey went out today for mascot and school name. They should know by December 11. Their projected enrollment is 1994. He is concerned that juniors will choose to stay at Herriman.

**MOTION:** Mr. Sherwood motioned to approve the three new school membership applications. Mr. Grunig seconded the motion. Motion carried.

5. **USBE Report:** Ms. Belnap said the State Board oversees fees and is looking for school compliance. She reported who was on the task force reviewing fees: Board members, legislators, superintendents, principals, charter board directors, etc. There are 15 members and good representation. The committee has been meeting every Monday for four hours since July. She reviewed the consequences if schools and districts are not compliant. She said there will be training before consequences. The drafted rule will be out in December. They spent eight hours just defining, “fees.” UHSAA Board members voiced concern that programs will drop. Ms. Belnap encouraged them to pay attention when the rule comes out and make comments to direct the USBE.

Ms. Belnap said Mr. Cuff reported at Board meeting and the report was accepted and there has been no talk about UHSAA this week. Ms. Belnap was thanked for her service.

**7. Football Endowment Games Report:** Mr. Cuff reported the football endowment revenue for this year was \$98,941. There was bad weather this year with 22 games affected by lightning and three games were suspended. Most patrons paid before the bad weather hit. The Foundation will reimburse schools at 100% of the schools' catastrophic premium. Schools have received 100% reimbursement seven of the nine years since Foundation disbursements began. The Foundation is disbursing \$140,000 and the UHSAA will provide the additional \$40,000.

**MOTION:** Ms. Richards motioned to transfer the football endowment revenue to the UHSAA Foundation account. Mr. Sherwood seconded the motion. Motion carried.

#### **8. Fall Activities Report:**

A. Volleyball: Ms. Whittaker reported there were seven great days of volleyball. The format was changed for 5A/6A with consolation games all in one day which shortened the days. They will be looking to tweak the 1A/2A tournament to help shorten those days after the realignment is adopted.

B. Boys' Golf: Ms. Whittaker announced there will be many changes to the rules of golf. There will be clinics for coaches and players in February and March.

C. Football: Mr. Jackson reported on the football tournaments. 1A semifinals were held at Payson HS, 2A at Timpview HS and 3A at Provo HS. Mr. Jackson thanked those schools for hosting. 1A/2A/3A finals were at Weber State University. The finals for 4A/5A/6A would be held the following day at the University of Utah. Credentials were available for board members.

D. Girls' Soccer: Juan Diego and Jordan High School hosted the semifinals. Finals were held at Rio Tinto and athletes are excited to play there.

E. Cross Country: Mr. Oglesby said the event went well and Highland HS is a great host. The weather provided perfect conditions for the runners.

F. Girls' Tennis: This was the first year of ticketing at tennis. Mr. Oglesby felt it was a success. Mr. Jarman encouraged communication to continue regarding ticketing for spring tennis.

G. Baseball: Mr. Cluff said the 1A Championship was held at Dixie State. Somehow, the tournament skirted around weather for the games played in Spanish Fork. The 1A communities are very supportive of their teams.

9. **Calendar:** Mr. Oglesby reported sites are updated as soon as possible on the website calendar. The 2019-2020 tentative calendar will be posted soon.

#### 10. **Follow-Up Items from Previous Meetings:**

A. Spirit of Sports Award (January 15): Mr. Cuff encouraged committee members and member schools to send nominations. The individual should have demonstrated exemplary sportsmanship and citizenship as the game should be played or has exceeded normal expectations in assisting others in the school or community or has overcome adversity or a challenging circumstance.

B. Heart of the Arts Award (January 15): This award is usually presented to someone in theatre, speech or music with the same criteria as Spirit of Sport Award above. The state winners are sent on to Section 7/8 and if chosen sent to NFHS for consideration of national winners.

C. Sportsmanship Items – School Video Competition (p. 57): Ms. Whittaker reported that schools were asked to create a tutorial video on sportsmanship that could be shown at their school. Ms. Whittaker announced the winners and they will be awarded a \$1,000 scholarship.

These videos will be shown at state tournaments. Schools are asked to participate in creating a video and is required for the "Earn a Star" Sportsmanship Program.

D. UHSAA Student Leadership Conference: The Conference will be held on Thursday, June 13, 2019 at Jordan High School.

E. Coaches' Certification: Mr. Jackson reminded members that the UHSAA tracks the certification, but it is the school and districts' responsibility to make sure coaches are certified. NFHSlearn.com has added many new videos to help complete certification requirements if the district approves.

F. Lacrosse: Mr. Oglesby talked about the final recommendation for game limitation, tournament structure, moratorium and state tournament structure for boys and girls' lacrosse as approved by the BOT in the last meeting for first consideration. The Executive Committee has again recommended the proposal to the BOT. This would be the second consideration of the BOT.

**MOTION:** Mr. Sherwood motioned to approve the lacrosse recommendations as a second consideration. Mr. McKee seconded the motion. Motion passed.

(1) Alpine School District Proposal: Mr. Oglesby said the Alpine District is requesting permission to allow sanctioned UHSAA teams to play non-sanctioned club teams in Alpine District. Mr. Jarman said Alpine District is appealing the Executive Committee's decision to not approve their proposal. Alpine School District is asking for a one-year reprieve to allow club teams in their area to schedule games with sanctioned teams willing to schedule games with their club teams. This would not be for region or state tournaments. Alpine School District wants to finish artificial fields and then sanction lacrosse the second year. Mr. Oglesby reported that the Executive Committee was unanimously opposed to the proposal. They felt communications would be difficult with the club leadership for transportation and game arrangements/management. There would be no school oversight for ejection, eligibility, etc. and they felt this would be a paradigm shift in Association policy. Mr. Cuff said it had been reported that the current lacrosse governing body is dissolving, and he asked who would be overseeing the clubs. Mr. Jarman said they are asking for one year allowing clubs teams. Mr. Cuff asked if intramurals would be considered for one year. Mr. Jarman said that might be a possibility. Mr. Sherwood said it is problematic with no school contact for the sanctioned teams. Mr. Jarman said he was not aware of the ULA dissolving and that was new information.

**MOTION:** Mr. Sherwood motioned to deny the proposed Memo of Understanding with Alpine District for lacrosse and support the Executive Committee decision to not accept the proposal. Mr. Schena seconded the motion. Discussion. Motion carried.

G. Unified Sports: Mr. Oglesby discussed the success of the program is with the partnership with Special Olympics Utah (SOUT). SOUT has a new staff member, Courtnie Worthen, who over the schools' partnership program and is eager and ready to help schools. Mr. Oglesby encouraged members that are not participating to reconsider participating in Unified Sports. Mr. Oglesby is working with Unified Track and Mr. Jackson is working with Unified Soccer. A survey will go to every school asking for declaration of participation in soccer, track or both. The soccer schedule will be built from the survey.

H. NFHS #MyReasonWhy: Mr. Oglesby said there will be a co-branded PSA with UHSAA/NFHS in the next month and it will be shared with media. Additionally, NFHS is encouraging middle school and junior high school students to look forward to participating in high school sports and activities. There will be free posters available to these schools. Mr. Oglesby will share the link for free posters as soon as he receives the information.

I. Communications Committee Report: Mr. Oglesby reported a great effort has been made to increase the social media presence for the UHSAA. Matt Garrish has done a great job at all levels of championships. The schools' branding as well as UHSAA's sponsor, Mtn. America, is being used. There were over 132,000 impressions on twitter and over 6,000 engagements (people sharing our content).

J. Academic All-State: Mr. Oglesby reported on the new Academic All-State program. There are many more students being recognized with the use of the new matrix allowing recognition of students with a high ACT score but not a perfect 4.0. He feels it has been successful. The certificates were slow in being sent to schools with staff changes and the increase in applications. For the first time, senior activity participants (music, drama and forensics) can apply for the Academic All-State Award. They will apply through RegisterMyAthlete. Mr. Holmes said he had been approached as to why the award is not presented at the state tournaments. Mr. Cuff said we are awarding more certificates than previously. There were 51 winners in 5A boys' cross country. There is not enough time to award that many at a tournament. The Executive Committee felt when it changed to include the arts and to be consistent the certificates would be sent to the school and the school would present. We are awarding more and that is a positive. It is a change. Mr. Sherwood felt it was more significant for the student to receive the award in front of peers and teachers. Ms. Shill said they are recognized at their school board meeting.

Mr. Cuff said the UIAAA is awarding a Team GPA Award for all sports. Mr. Sherwood said the AD submits the accumulative GPA of all varsity team members. UIAAA sends an email to every school requesting the information.

K. Diversity Equity Committee: Mr. Cuff reported a parent reached out to meet with the UHSAA staff. During the meeting, the parent laid out every racial situation that has happened in high school sports for the past 15 years as reported by the media. He asked the staff what was being done. The take away from the meeting was: (1) Officials: If a racial slur or derogatory comment during a contest is reported, the officials will address immediately with both teams and both parties. The contest will be stopped if severe. If directly heard, they will flag and eject player(s) immediately. (2) Sportsmanship Committee will discuss the matter as an agenda item. (3) Diversity Equity Committee: Develop a committee with EC, BOT, staff, AD's, principals and officials of diverse, ethnicity backgrounds to help. Mr. Cuff felt being proactive would be beneficial. Mr. Sherwood felt the committee could organize and provide resources to schools. He referred to the video he presented to the Executive Committee, "Words that Don't Belong to Everyone." Mr. Miller felt this the committee is long overdue and is a good start and platform. He suggested adding diversity to the UHSAA boards even as an ad hoc member. He referred to a book, "Why Are all the Black Kids Sitting Together in the Cafeteria?" Students like to see there is 'somebody' like me. Mr. Cuff asked for committee member suggestions.

11. **BOT Elections Update:** Mr. Cuff reported that BOT Elections would be held on January 11 at the USBA Convention. No information will be sent until the realignment is finalized. There will be an election for the 2A and 5A school board member positions and possibly 1A if Wayne remains in 2A. Mr. Jarman's term expires June 30 and the superintendent's association will determine to extend the term or appoint a new representative. Mr. McKee's term ends June 30 and the Executive Committee will appoint a 3A principal to the BOT. Mr. Durst's term expires June 30 and there will be a charter school election on May 13.



12. **For the Good of the Order:** Mr. Cuff included articles that could be beneficial for members and schools.
